Attendance

I know many of you will have heard from an adult here in school about your child's attendance if it is due to fall below or has already fallen below our high thresholds. This is because we have an obligation to teach your child for 190 days throughout the year but we cannot do that if they are not here. As a result they may miss out on daily or weekly objectives that allow them to learn and progress in order to meet the national expected standards. If your child has time off unnecessarily you cannot expect them to have reached the expected standard at the end of the academic year. This is unfair. Do please try to get your child to school on time every day.

Scarlet fever

Many of you will have noted the scary media reports about the increase in the number of scarlet fever cases. Essentially, the advice remains the same; that children can continue to attend as normal unless they are unwell and have a high temperature. Further information on when a child is too ill for school or nursery is available. There is no requirement to be absent from school on a precautionary basis. School staff should continue to maintain their high expectations for face-to-face attendance.

Reception intake.

Please be aware that if you know of a friend or parent who has a child who is eligible to attend our Reception in September 2023, they MUST register their application by 15th January. It is not an automatic transition from our Nursery into Reception as places and finances are tight and we may restrict our pupil numbers. Please encourage anyone who has a child whose fifth birthday lands between the 1st September 2023 and the 31st August 2024 to apply this week. It may seem a long way off but they need to apply now. As you can imagine our budgets are tight and we have to maintain adult pupil ratios at an appropriate level.

Please make sure you keep moving forwards this weekend with resilience and determination.














Important Information - Attendance and Punctuality
