Dear Parents/Carers

As we reach the last two weeks of this academic year, change is in the air. Of course the political landscape is in turmoil and I have never known there to be 3 different education secretaries in one week! Whatever the external landscape looks like, our job is to make sure that the children in our care are well prepared for the next stage of education whether that be in another school or another class within our school. During school transitions this week, your child got to meet their new peers and their new teacher.

Class structure 2022-23

Our staffing structure throughout the school is changing next academic year. We are switching to all mixed year groups and I wanted to take this opportunity to explain the reasoning behind this move. Research strongly supports the idea that mixed-age classrooms are better for pupils. Not only pupils out-perform peers of the same age academically, studies also show that they thrive socially. Children are more likely to cooperate than compete, which makes it possible for children to see each other as individuals. Sometimes children in classrooms may be labelled as "below the expected level" or "low." As a result, these children may stop trying. Conversely, those labelled as "above the expected level" or "high" may not feel challenged, also resulting in a lack of effort. Some of you may have heard of the Vygotsky term ZPD (Zone of Proximal Development). The ZPD is the distance between a pupils' ability to perform a task under adult guidance and/or with peer collaboration and their ability to solve the problem independently. Mixed-age classrooms free children to take pride in their abilities as individuals, giving them constant motivation to improve. In order to ensure consistent provision between classes, teachers across the school are able to plan jointly and use their skills to teach subjects to a deeper level. With the introduction of our 2 year curriculum cycle last year, it is important pupils do not repeat what they have learnt already and the knowledge they acquire is embedded in their long term memory. Finally, I believe that multi-age classrooms are socially and psychologically healthy because they promote friendship and provide extended contact with adults and peers of varying ages. These groups show a notable increase in self-esteem.

Support

As always, there is a fear factor associated with change but I ask once again to guide your child to think about what they can do and how they can achieve more than worrying if their friend is in their class. This was the focus of my assembly. At the end of the day, we have a responsibility to decide how best to teach your child. We have considered the class teaching and mix carefully and ensured that support staff are deployed to aid progression. This week our staff meetings are all about handing over information from one class teacher to another about your child's needs. There will be many times when your child will work alongside different teachers and pupils next year and of course they will be with their old friends (and hopefully new) at break and lunch. I'm confident that if we work together and remain positive, seeing this new change as a new challenge we can continue to produce pupils who are independent, confident and resilient. The transition days have gone well despite some initial trepidation. Do not forget that your child's new class teacher will be available on dojo to sort out worries and concerns in September.


Seven Fields Fete 2022






























Bumblebee class have worked together as a team to build a path and took turns walking along it.



The children in Sparrows have been making scrumptious sandwiches in class.










After raising the most money for penny wars Wrens were treated to there 30 minutes party this afternoon and were joined by our lovely PTA members Charlotte and Tracey.






Alexia, TJ, Alexa, Noah, Jake, Logan, George, Kayden, Matilde and Lola all received bronze badges for reaching 30 house points.
