<p><b>bible:</b> The Christian holy book, which is made up of two main parts: the Old Testament and the New Testament.</p> <p><b>Old Testament :</b> The first part of the Bible. Stories in the Bible which happened before Jesus was born.</p> <p><b>New Testament:</b> The second part of the Bible. Stories about Jesus and his followers.</p> <p><b>Covenant :</b> An agreement, pact or promise.</p> <p><b>Church :</b> Christian place of worship.</p> <p><b>The altar :</b> a table where the bread and wine are blessed .</p> <p><b>The pulpit :</b> where the priest delivers sermons.</p> <p><b>The lectern :</b> a stand where the Bible is read from</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Christians are committed to God and show their commitment in different ways.</li> <li>• One way is through following the Ten Commandments.</li> <li>• Many Christians show commitment to God by attending church every Sunday and worshipping God.</li> <li>• Christians believe that praying to God shows commitment.</li> <li>• Lots of Christians dedicate their lives to acting in ways that they think will please God.</li> <li>• Christians to worship together in a church. Most churches hold services every Sunday and throughout the week. Rites of passage, such as baptisms, marriages and funerals, are held in local churches. This important function of churches enables whole communities to be involved in these celebrations in the lives of Christians.</li> <li>• A Christian wedding is like a covenant because both parties make promises – to each other and to God.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Gurdwara</b> The Gurdwara is the Sikh place of worship, literally meaning 'door to the Guru'. They are open to everyone, although Sikhs ask that shoes are removed and heads are covered before entry.</li> <li>• <b>Synagogue</b> Jews worship God in a synagogue. Jewish people attend services at the synagogue on Saturdays during Shabbat. Shabbat (the Sabbath) is the most important time of the week for Jews. It begins on Friday evenings and ends at sunset on Saturdays.</li> <li>• <b>Mosque</b> Muslims worship in a building called a mosque. On Friday at noon, the most important of the weekly services is held. When Muslims pray, they must always face Makkah in Saudi Arabia.</li> <li>• <b>Mandir</b> Hindus worship in a temple called a Mandir. Mandirs vary in size from small village shrines to large buildings, surrounded by walls. People can also visit the Mandir at any time to pray and participate in the bhajans (religious songs).</li> <li>• <b>Temples</b> In Buddhist countries there are many temples. People bring flowers and incense for the shrine and food for the monks. When entering a temple, Buddhists will take off their shoes, put their hands together and bow to the image of the Buddha.</li> </ul>
